

Dear Friends:

As we consider 2024 and all of the issues that confronted Catholic Charities this year, the dramatic increase in homelessness across our Diocese takes precedence. Homelessness is an "equal opportunity" challenge and can be found in every community, large and small, that we serve. As the number of homeless individuals increases, so does our response to address this emerging need. In addition to traditional shelters, Catholic Charities has been busy opening warming centers, expanding housing programs, fortifying emergency services, and developing innovative approaches, like tiny homes initiatives, to provide

for the most basic need: shelter.

In several communities, we have seen an increase of over 50% in homelessness since 2019. While the numbers are on the rise, affordable housing is essentially non-existent. The combination of these two factors leads to hundreds, if not thousands, of housing-vulnerable people in our Diocese.

There is no simple solution to homelessness. The underlying issues are multidimensional and varied. What we do know is that no real change can occur until we provide homeless individuals with the basics: food, clothing, and a place where they "belong" and experience hospitality and compassion. That is where Catholic Charities comes in, serving the most vulnerable members of our community.



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
